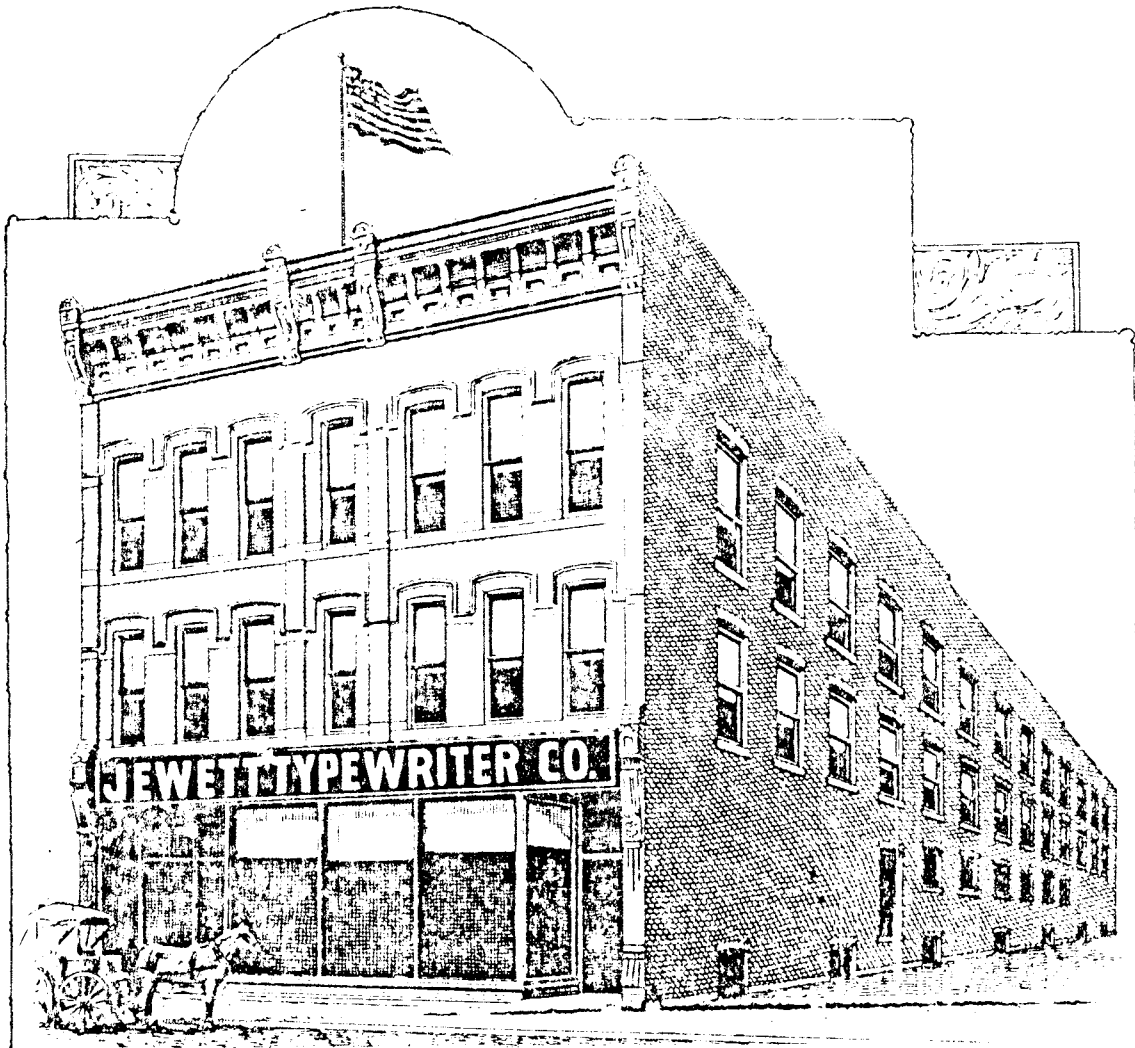

Jennie Marie (Jewett) Fuller (18215) died 4 Feb 2001 at Doctor's Hospital, Coral Gables, Dade, FL. She was born 14 Apr 1901 in Winchester MA. She was two years old when she went to Cuba with her parents and brothers Clyde and Miles, and a black maid named Lilly. They left the United States 28 Nov 1903 and arrived at Lewiston, Oriente, Cuba 7 Dec 1903. Albin Jewett went to Cuba after the Spanish American War to oversee a lumber mill in Lewiston. He returned to the United States after completing the operation there but then ended up buying the land and lumber mill from his employer and returning to Cuba.

Jennie was educated mostly by tutors in Cuba and was then sent by her parents to study at Browns Business College in Kankakee IL. After graduation she returned to Cuba where she went to work for a Canadian bank branch office in Holguin where she held an important position for the bank's president since she was fluent in both Spanish and English.

Jennie had been a member of the Everglade Chapter of the DAR, Miami FL since 1975 and was the Matriarch of the Jewett Family in America of South Florida.

She married William Otis Fuller 31 Dec 1925, a nephew of Albin Jewett's first wife. William was born in Portland ME and went to Cuba for a visit, and the rest is history! Jennie returned to the United States in 1960, never to return to Cuba, after her son Robert (Bobby) Fuller was sentenced and shot for revolting against the Communist Cuban

The Jewett Typewriter Company

The Developer, Devoted to Commercial, Industrial, Mining and Railway Interests, 1901

The Jewett Typewriter Company is an institution of which Des Moines is justly proud. Its origin dates back to 1888, but some time and much money was spent in experimenting and perfecting their typewriter, and it was not until 1892 that the machine was ready for the market. Their success at the World's Fair in Chicago, where they received the highest awards, both Medal and Diploma of Honor, over all other competitors, brought the machine rapidly into prominence, and since that date their business has increased until now the JEWETT is used in all civilized countries. The business of the company has been a success from the beginning; starting with but two mechanics, they now have over 200 employees, and their weekly payroll distributes some \$2500.00 in Des Moines.

While they have a good machine to sell, yet much of their success is due to the wise management of the officers and board of directors. They are all of our most highly respected citizens, and men who have been successful in their other business enterprises. No body of men in the state of Iowa stand higher than they do.

The president of the Jewett Typewriter Co., its organizer and chief promoter is Geo. A. Jewett (10069 in Volume

II of the *History and Genealogy of the Jewetts of America*, 11173 in Volume III). Mr. Jewett is an old resident of Des Moines, having located here in 1865, although then a young man, he at once thoroughly identified himself with Des Moines business interests, and for twenty-five years has been esteemed one of her first and safest business men. He is a member of the firm of Ewing & Jewett, lumber dealers, and it is safe to say that through his energy, enterprise and fair dealing this firm has developed one of the largest and best lumber businesses in the West. His well known ability and his genius for organization has made him much sought for by other corporations, and as a result, he is totally identified with a large number of interests in this city.

The progress and stability of Des Moines, this center of commercial activity is due in a large measure to his counsel and influence. Mr. Jewett is keenly interested in philanthropies. He is a leading factor, and inspiring spirit in the management of Drake University, having been the secretary of its Board of Directors from its foundation. It is an open secret that much of the success of this marvelously successful institution of learning is due directly to his skill in financial management. In a particular instance he engineered an investment which realized for the University nearly \$500,000 within three months. Drake University, now in its 20th year, with 1900 students, next to its illustrious founder is indebted to the friendship of Geo. A. Jewett.

Other philanthropies espoused by him have been greatly blessed by his benevolence and far seeing business sagacity. It is quite within bounds to say that the beautiful stone temple of the central Church of Christ, which cost more than \$100,000, would not stand as it does today - the embodiment of beauty and workmanship - but for his inspiring counsels and his generous gifts. His firm was by far the largest contributors to its erection, as they have been for thirty years to its support. Mr. Jewett enjoys the unqualified and unlimited confidence of every business man and every laboring man as well as every woman and child in this city. He has earned such a position of honor and usefulness as few men hold by his fine and wise sagacity, his sterling integrity, his triumphal success in every undertaking. He is exceptionally strong in conceptions and plans, but equally strong in execution. He is a consummate master of detail. In all these thirty five years of business career the strongest light upon his enterprise has left not the slightest stain upon his escutcheon. The reason for this is not difficult to discern. It is found in his strong stalwart conscientious religious character, of which his face is an index. For thirty seven years he has been an officer in the Central Church of Christ. He is a Christian to the core. He esteems his good name priceless. Whatever successes the future may hold for him the people of Des Moines will earnestly hope that the future development of his gigantic enterprises may not take him permanently from Des Moines, which has hitherto been the center of his splendid triumphs...

There is a surprise in store for one going through this factory. We did not expect to find a shop so well equipped, so systematically arranged into departments as this one is. They have all modern up-to-date machinery. While they are conservative in their management, yet they are progressive. As to the shop equipments, automatic machinery enables one man to do that which under the old system would require five. Then, too, every part is inter-changeable. All parts are made exactly alike, no material is wasted. The shop is clean. It is a credit to the superintendent, Mr. Geo. W. Singleton. Mr. Singleton, by the way, has had a varied experience in various eastern factories, and no doubt is the most thorough all-around mechanic in the West. He knows how to get all the good out of his workers. He does not scorn an idea if it comes from the janitor. The company has adopted the idea of asking their men to think. They offer awards for the best thought for improvement of their typewriters or in the manner of their construction. All such suggestions are referred to a committee of the foremen, who decide which one is the most meritorious, and the awards are granted in accordance with the committee's recommendation. In this way the company has all of its two hundred employees thinking for them and helping them to build the "best Typewriter in the World..."

The experimental department is the most interesting, as it is here where new ideas are fostered and developed. There are four high-class men employed in this department, who devote all their time to improving the JEWETT, or devising more improved machinery for building it. We note that they are now perfecting several new models, which will soon be upon the market. These will contain many new and valuable features. The Hanger Department contains the finest lot of delicate machinery we have ever seen, the hanger being the most particular part of the typewriter, the slightest error in the construction spoiling the machine. It requires very accurate machinery to manufacture it. In the Enameling Department we find artists of whom Des Moines is proud. With a few clever strokes of the brush they turn out the JEWETT, traced with delicate and artistic lines and scrolls, a neat and ornamental piece of machinery... In the Inspection Department we notice the machines are all carefully examined by several inspectors, each machine in turn must pass the hands of each inspector. Page after page is written on the machine and carefully criticized. If a machine is not fully up to standard it is sent back and the workman responsible is called to account. In the Packing and Shipping Department we saw machines ready for shipment to various parts of the world: France, England, Russia, Mexico, Canada, etc. Everything was a model of system...

Opening off from the office of the President and General Manager is the Sales Department where we find the most complete follow-up system in use. A corps of stenographers are answering inquiries. If you do not want to buy a JEWETT typewriter, better not answer any of their advertisements, they never let up, you will have to buy to shut off the letters and printed matter they will send you. Another branch of the Sales Department is the Agents Correspondence. Then comes the Advertising Department. Here clerks are busy looking over magazines and newspapers published in all parts of the world and in nearly every known tongue, checking the advertisements of the JEWETT. Every medium is given credit for the inquiries resulting from their advertisement. Then comes the General Office attending to the general correspondence, cashier with assistants, the bookkeeper and assistants and a score of stenographers and check clerks, checking reports of agents and keeping track of their machines. As soon as a typewriter is started its history begins, a card is made which follows it through the factory with various notations as to dates commenced, finished, inspected, etc. Then to what agency shipped, what date and to whom and when sold. Nor is its history finished then. They keep track of it after that as they hear from it, from time to time, and when it has been out a number of years the Sales Department takes it up again, writing the owner asking him if he is not ready to buy a late improved JEWETT and they do not let up till he does. The Filing Room is completeness itself. It is here where all the letters and papers find their final resting place.

The Jewett Typewriter Co. has the foundation for an immense business. They have the machine, the management, the plant and the location and there is no reason why it should not be the leading concern of the kind in the world.

Des Moines Register, 28 Oct 1929

...In 1879 George A. Jewett and two partners founded a lumber company in Des Moines that was to become a leader in the city's growth. Ewing, Jewett and Chandler, later to be known as the Jewett Lumber Company, was established at Sixth and Cherry Streets. Two years after its founding, in 1881, Chandler left the business. The Wabash railroad set up a rail station on the lumber yard site and the lumber company moved to Ninth and Locust Streets. Ewing died a short time later and by 1906 Jewett, the remaining partner, owned all interest in the company. Appropriately, he renamed the firm, The Jewett Lumber Company.

In the years between the founding of the lumber company and Jewett's acquisition of it, Jewett founded another company, unrelated to the lumber business. That firm was the Jewett Typewriter Company at Sixth and Locust. An industrious businessman, Jewett made ten trips to Europe to promote his typewriter business and crossed the English Channel or North Sea between London and the Continent 242 times. His typewriter received the highest award given at the Chicago World's Fair in 1893, and the gold medallion award at the Paris Exposition in 1900. In 1901, it was pegged "The World's Finest Typewriter." The Jewett Typewriter Company was later purchased by the Underwood Typewriter Company...

Jewett-Leonard Connection

Researching my family genealogy of McCall, Fisher, and Leonard lines, I came across an interesting reference to Capt. Joseph Jewett (780) of the 8th Connecticut Regiment in the Revolutionary War. Silas Leonard, born in Lyme CT in 1746, fourth generation of Seth, Uriah, and James Leonard, served with Capt. Jewett's regiment and also served under General Gates at Saratoga and at the surrender of Burgoyne.

Nearly 200 years later, another Jewett-Leonard connection occurred when David Francis Jewett (17484), eleventh Jewett generation, of New Paltz NY and Mary Jane McCall, ninth Leonard generation, of Milford MI married in 1952.

David Francis Jewett (17484) and wife Mary Jane (McCall) Jewett are life members of the Jewett Family of America, Inc. and make their home in Sun Lakes AZ.

Calling All Michigan Jewetts

The entries for the descendants of Eleazer Jewett (2866) in Volume III of the *History and Genealogy of the Jewetts of America* are incomplete and need updating. Eleazer Jewett came to Saginaw MI in 1826 where he was a surveyor, fur trader, hotel keeper and judge. For a long time there was very active group of Michigan Jewetts. Query Replies

The photograph of David R. Jewett on the cover of the 2000 Quarterly No.1 has been tentatively identified as David Richard Jewett born 7 Jul 1851 in Scioto County NY. His father was William Jewett born 8 Jan 1819 in Scioto County OH; his grandfather was William Jewett born 31 Dec 1895 in Canada. The identification was made by Harold "Hal" Crowder Jewett who is also descended from William Jewett born 31 Dec 1895. The fact that the photograph was taken in Rochester NY is the reason for the tentative identification.

Note from Historian: The following Cluster 2576 has been put together from information found in Supplemental File 2576. I need information on this line for a follow-up article about the tragedy which occurred at John Jewett & Sons on 5 Apr 1877. This will be covered in a later Quarterly. Do any of our readers have information on this line? I have received a great deal of information from Allen Whittemore whose query on Grace Theodora Duer Whittemore can be found in this Quarterly.

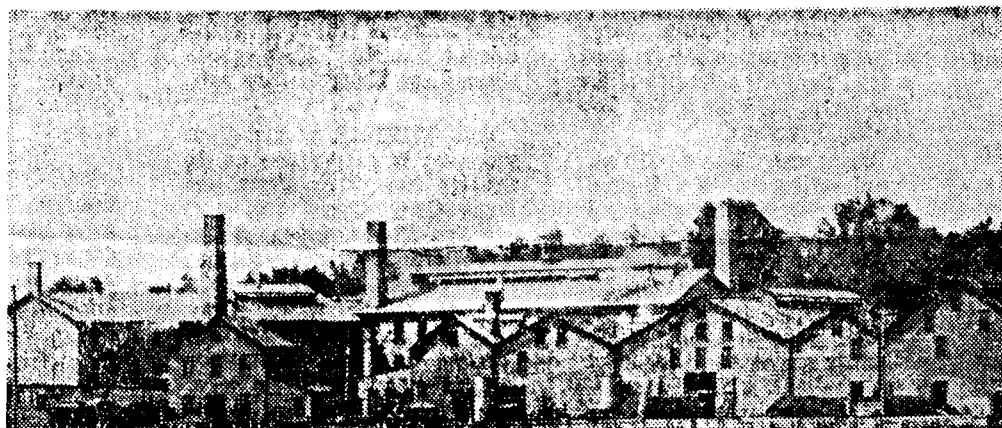
2576 **JOHN JEWETT** (John¹²⁸⁶, Joseph⁵⁵⁶, Ezra¹⁹¹, Aquila⁶⁵, Joseph¹¹, Maximilian³, Edward¹). Born 1 Dec 1787 in Westford MA. Died 23 Dec 1867 in Orange NJ.

 He married first **LUCY BARRETT RIPLEY** 24 Oct 1808. Born 27 Oct 1787. Died 6 Mar 1859. Daughter of Noah and Lucy (Barrett) Ripley.

 He married second **SARAH STONE RIPLEY** who was the half-sister of his first wife. She was 67 when they were married and he was 73.

 "When he became of age he went to New York, where by industry and perserverance he was eminently successful in business and acquired a fortune. He was highly respected as an ahonorable, honest, and upright man. He had two wives; the last one survived him. His children are established in New York in the same business pursued by himself. He retired from business some years before his death, and died at his country seat, Orange NJ 23 Dec 1867." (*History of Petersborough NH* as quoted in Volume I of the *History and Genealogy of the Jewetts of America*.)

 John Jewett established the Jewett White Lead Works at Port Richmond, Staten Island, NY in 1842. Later a plant for the manufacture of linseed oil was added. The firm later became John Jewett & Sons, consisting of John Jewett and his sons John Jewett Jr., George W. Jewett, and Charles H. Jewett.

January 2001

Dear friends and family,

Happy New Year, Decade, Century, and Millennium! What a unusual event the turning over of a New Year was this year. It is the only time in our lifetime and that of our descendants for many, many generations to come that people will be able to express their wishes to each other for success and happiness in those four time units!

And speaking of the passage of time, it has been far too long an interval since we last communicated with you. Last August, we older generation Jewetts again set up residence in the Ixil area--this time in the town of Nebaj. We're finding, however, that maintaining living quarters in two places -- here in Guatemala City as well as in Nebaj -- is complicated! For example, as we were getting ready to send out this newsletter, we discovered that our list of your addresses is on the computer in Nebaj, which used to be here in Guatemala City. So we have decided to forego the fanciness and just do a "plain vanilla" letter this time just to let you know we are still alive and working. All we have to do now is get ourselves reunited with our address list so we can get this letter in the mail and on its way to you.

To begin with, we want to thank you for all the Christmas cards and newsletters you sent our way. We enjoyed them immensely and will try to answer them little by little. In the process, we will likely find how long it takes letters mailed in Nebaj to reach you. A special Christmas blessing for us was having Rachel and Sara here for almost three weeks. It was wonderful to have them, and very hard to send them off to the US again. We are proud of them and thank the Lord they are doing well in college. Speaking of e-mail, would those of you who have access to e-mail be so kind as to send us your address? We're discovering that living in the countryside is making the regular mail process more difficult for us, but one of our New Year's resolutions is to update you more frequently. So, if possible, we would like to do so via e-mail, to which we usually have access now from Nebaj. Dwight_Jewett@sil.org is our e-mail address. After our move to Nebaj in August, Dwight started working with the two Ixil translators there to help them finish up the New Testament in the dialect of Ixil spoken there. Meanwhile, he is also continuing to supervise the five Ixil co-workers who comprise the translation reviewers' committee in Chajul. Consequently, Dwight is currently working three days a week in Nebaj and commuting one hour each way to Chajul each of the other two days. Steady progress is being made on both translation projects, but there is still a fair amount of work to be done before either New Testament can be published. Please continue to pray that the Lord would give us health and stamina for the task. Once again we thank you for your continuing interest in and support of the Ixil translation projects.
